# The Urban Farm 4 H Club



## **What is 4-H?**

*A youth development program in existence for more than 100 years.*

*Purpose is to assist youth by helping them become self-directed, productive, contributing members and leaders of society through interaction with adults who care.*

*All children and youth between the ages of 5 and 18 can become members of 4-H.*



## **Who sponsors 4-H?**

*Nationally by the United States Department of Agriculture*

*Funded as part of the CSU Extension Program.*

*Organized and run by volunteers.*



## **What is the significance of the four leaf clover?**

*The clover is the 4-H emblem and signifies the meaning of each of the H's – head, heart, hands, and health.*



## **What do kids do in The Urban Farm's 4-H Club?**

*Learn and grow by completing projects – Horse, cow, swine, goats, sheep, poultry, rabbits, shooting, fiber (spinning, knitting weaving, etc), dogs.*

*Work with the adults to set project goals, make plans to reach those, and complete the projects.*

*Demonstrate new skills and give oral reports to their club.*

*Work in teams as well as individually with the project leader and resource people.*

*Demonstrate their projects at county or even state fair.*

*Participate in livestock projects without having to own and house livestock at their own home.*



## **How often do TUF 4-H members participate in meetings?**

*All members must attend the monthly general meetings.*

*Meetings are always on the third Thursday of the month from 6:00 – 7:00 p.m.*

*Attend project meetings as set by the project leader (See calendar).*

*Interact with and care for their animals.*



## **How much does it cost to be a TUF 4-H member?**

*Annual membership cost is \$25. (check payable to Adams County 4H)*

*Other costs for projects are generally small and the kids conduct fundraisers to earn money for bigger projects.*

*Membership year begins in October of each year.*
